# **Introduction to IGF 2019**

The Internet Governance Forum (IGF) 2019 brought together representatives from governments, the technical community, business and civil society to discuss amplifying digital cooperation. The IGF, convened for the fourteenth time since its establishment in 2005, was hosted by the Government of Germany in Berlin.

Under the overarching theme, 'One World. One Net. One Vision', the IGF 2019 provided a substantive multistakeholder platform for engaged and informed discussions about policy issues pertaining to the Internet, and how the Internet can support and fulfil the nexus of respecting human rights and achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

#### In detail:

1. Highly Focused Themes Guiding Intersessional and Berlin Activities

An open, bottom-up Call for Thematic Inputs launched in January 2019 identified three themes as the highest priorities for IGF participants. These themes helped shape many of the preparatory and intersessional work processes for IGF 2019.

- Data governance
- Digital inclusion
- Security, safety, stability and resilience

#### 2. Strong Host Government Vision for IGF 2019

Since first offering to host the IGF 2019 two years ago, the Government of Germany remained highly engaged in all substantive and logistical aspects of the organisation of the 14th Annual Meeting of the IGF.

#### 2.1 Strengthened Support for the Engagement of Under-Represented Stakeholders

An important objective for the Government of Germany throughout its preparations has been to strengthen the IGF and the relevance of the multistakeholder approach to maintain a truly global, open, free and human rights-centered Internet without barriers.

#### **High-Level Leaders Track**

On IGF 2019 Day 0, Germany's Minister of Economic Affairs and Energy chaired a meeting of more than 100 high ranking representatives from governments, business and civil society to discuss with them topics around data governance, digital inclusion and network security. The track included a Ministerial Breakfast with representatives from 28 countries and institutions.

In addition, the Government of Germany:

- Ensured all meeting rooms and facilities were fully accessible
- Provided child care services and assistance for people that need help were offered

#### 2.2 Promoting Sustainability

To make IGF 2019 the most inclusive and innovative IGF to date, the Government of Germany encouraged the use of digital applications to make the IGF a "paperless" event. Reusable water bottles and water refilling stations were also provided for participants to reduce waste from the event and a sustainability area was installed to inform participants.

#### 3. Strengthened Links Between IGF and United Nations Processes

IGF deliberations have long contributed to the discussions taking place every year at the United Nations General Assembly in New York at the United Nations Headquarters. IGF has existing relationships with Second and Third Committees:

- IGF is regularly referred to in the resolutions of the Second Committee (Economic & Financial), such as resolutions on Information and Communications Technologies for Sustainable Development.
- Discussions in IGF sessions on cyber threats, including cyber crime, inform the discussions at the Third Committee (Social, Humanitarian & Cultural Issues).

In 2019, IGF added active engagement with the First Committee (Disarmament and International Security Committee) as well as the United Nations Secretary-General's High-Level Panel on Digital Cooperation.

#### New, targeted IGF communication channels

#### UN Secretary-General's High-Level Panel on Digital Cooperation (HLPDC)

As part of the preparatory process, there were online consultations in the lead-up to Berlin to collect feedback from Internet governance stakeholders on Internet-governance-related recommendations in the HLPDC report.

The results of the online consultation then informed discussions in Berlin on the HLPDC's Internet governance-related recommendations.

At IGF 2019, the UN Secretary-General stated, "I will soon appoint a Technology Envoy to work with governments, industry and civil society to help advance international frameworks, and nurture a shared digital future that puts people first and helps bridge the social divide."

#### **UN General Assembly First Committee**

Cybersecurity BPF outputs and Berlin IGF Messages on Security, Safety, Stability and Resilience were developed with an aim of being transmitted:

- Group of Governmental Experts on Developments in the Field of Information and Telecommunications in the Context of International Security
- Open-Ended Working Group (OEWG) on Developments in the Field of Information and Telecommunications in the Context of International Security

The week after IGF 2019 in Berlin, a coordinator from the Cybersecurity BPF presented the BPF's 2019 report at the open consultation session of OEWG in New York.

# Overarching theme of 14th IGF: One World. One Net. One Vision.

Hosted in a country where memories of the tearing down of a physical wall and resulting reunification are still fresh in the minds of many of its citizens, the main theme of "One World. One Net. One Vision." resonated highly with participants at IGF 2019. In a world where there is an increasing trend to erect physical barriers between nations, participants in Berlin reflected on the social, cultural and economic effects of similar barriers, both intentional and otherwise, being raised in the online world via developments as diverse as:

- Differing legal and regulatory regimes
- Efforts to undermine online security via both states and malicious actors
- The spread of misinformation via social media algorithms
- The failure to adequately address growing digital divides

#### **High-Level Statements on the Overarching Theme**

In the Opening Session of IGF 2019, United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres observed that virtual walls also have the effect of amplifying existing digital, social and political divides. He declared, "If we do not work together to address these divides, we will be remembered as the generation that ruined the early promise of the Internet."

Also in the Opening Session, the German Chancellor Angela Merkel noted that just as people's yearning for freedom, connection and a hope for progress had resulted in the fall of the Berlin Wall, the same values were behind the vision of the creators of the Internet and the World Wide Web. She urged participants: "May you be inspired by this location, where 30 years ago, when the Wall fell, it marked the dawn of a new age."

Both Guterres and Merkel supported the United Nations as the appropriate platform for reshaping global Internet governance to ensure a free, open, and decentralized Internet that is secure and stable and can support development for all. Both reinforced the IGF, a platform for all stakeholders to come together and address pressing policy issues related to the Internet, as the most appropriate forum within the United Nations for advancing and evolving Internet governance norms and frameworks.

## **IGF 2019 Messages**

The three main themes identified by IGF participants as the highest priorities for 2019 complement the overarching theme of IGF 2019, "One World. One Net. One Vision":

- Data governance addresses the challenges of strengthening the protection of people's fundamental rights and freedoms while working to ensure there is one interconnected and global Internet.
- Digital exclusion results entrenches social and economic divides and exclusion based on gender, race, identity and income. **Digital inclusion** is to "One network. One world. One vision" what social inclusion and human rights are to sustainable development and security.
- **Safety, Security, Stability and Resilience** are paramount for the Internet to achieve its potential as a channel of free speech and an engine for economic growth.

#### Messages by the UN Secretary-General & the Chancellor of Germany on main themes

#### **Digital Inclusion**

- Technical innovations are there to serve people and not the other way around.
- We need to better understand the relationship between digital advances and inequality: inequality and exclusion drive social unrest and conflict; digital technologies can either widen digital, social and economic divides, or be a force to help reduce them.
- Attacks against Internet connectivity have become a dangerous instrument of politics.

#### Security, Safety, Stability and Resilience

#### Data Governance

- Flows of data and information link up communities, cities, countries and continents, bringing people together beyond traditional barriers established through politics, through religion or social status.
- Artificial Intelligence and algorithms, if not governed effectively, can be used to monitor and manipulate behaviour, to besiege us with ever more targeted and intrusive advertising, to manipulate voters and to stifle freedom of expression.
- The answers to whether we become more, or less, secure and safe depends on our ability to work together across disciplines and actors, across nations and political divides.
- Low-intensity cyber-conflict between major States is not a prediction for the future but a feature of the present. In such a climate, mechanisms that build trust and cooperation are indispensable.

# **IGF 2019 Intersessional Work Tracks**

#### **Best Practice Forums**

There were four IGF Best Practice Forums (BPFs) in the leadup to the Berlin IGF:

BPF	Area of work
BPF on Cybersecurity	Implementing cybersecurity agreements
BPF on Gender and Access	Beyond access: Women and gender-diverse people's participation in the digital economy
BPF on Internet of Things, Big Data and Artificial Intelligence	Using IoT, Big Data, AI to address societal challenges
BPF on Local Content	Promoting and preserving linguistic diversity, cultural heritage and local content in contexts of political upheaval

BPF sessions on these topics exchanged views on policy challenges and best practices with relevant experts and stakeholder representatives.

Insights and community feedback from the Berlin sessions have been fed into the final reports published as outputs of the IGF 2019 BPFs.

#### **Dynamic Coalitions**

IGF Dynamic Coalitions (DCs) continued their work as independent, multistakeholder expert discussion groups on a variety of topics, respecting common standards of transparency and inclusiveness (open archives, open membership, open mailing lists).

#### National, Regional and Youth IGF Initiatives

More than 120 National, Regional and Youth IGF Initiatives (NRIs) used a bottom-up consultative process to agree on the topic, "Emerging Technologies", as a main priority issue for NRI discussion in Berlin. In addition, based on national and regional discussions held in NRIs in the leadup to IGF 2019, NRIs organized six collaborative sessions on topics of mutual interest:

- Access
- Cybersecurity
- Human rights
- Online content regulation
- Privacy and data protection

To discuss the long-term sustainability of the NRIs, there was an NRIs Coordination Session in which all NRIs present in Berlin met with the representatives of the UN DESA, MAG, IGF Secretariat and wider IGF community.

#### **IGF 2019 Preparatory Process**

The IGF meeting programme is prepared by the Multistakeholder Advisory Group (MAG) and IGF Secretariat over the course of the year. Key decisions on the programme are taken in the face-to-face meetings as well as regular virtual meetings of the MAG leading into the IGF.

In a new approach to shaping the programme in 2019, the MAG used the submissions received in response to the annual public call for issues to develop a more thematic, focused and non-duplicative design of the schedule. For the first time at the Berlin IGF, for each of the three main themes developed from the call for issues, there was an introductory session to set the scene for all the discussions happening throughout the week, and a concluding session to reflect on these discussions.
